Leading an organization with a legacy of service to York's children and families in need for 159 years, and counting, requires reverence and extraordinary commitment to its continued success. Efforts put to bear on behalf of our Home require maintaining sight of the needs of our children today but never losing sight of those who will need us in the future. In this edition of Here at Home, you will see all the ways we are working to meet the needs of our children and families today. What you do not see is how we are simultaneously planning for those who will need us for decades to come.

Throughout the years, Presidents, their teams, and the Board left an indelible mark that was used to build upon. Among other things, previous President Laurie Anne Spagnola, brought Sanctuary® to Children's Home of York – a trauma-informed approach to care that we continue to use today. Later, Dr. Joe Birli and his team created a new level of care in the state of Pennsylvania, RISE. RISE created an opportunity for our team to learn to meet the needs of adolescents that had a complexity that the child welfare delivery system was unable to meet. Without RISE, Children's Home of York would never have embarked upon our new program SOAR, which seeks to meet the complex needs of adolescents like those in RISE, but with an emphasis on psychiatric care as well.

Today's team seeks to leave a legacy too. We hope to continue upon the trajectory set forth of embedding excellence in our trauma-informed approach to care and meet the

needs of youth whom other organizations feel ill-equipped to serve. Simultaneously, we hope to create an unshakable financial foundation so Children's Home of York can withstand any internal or external threat that may present. We are doing so through a partnership with the York County Community Foundation where we have established an account to grow our legacy assets to create passive revenue that will sustain our mission for decades to come. As generous individuals in our community share the fruits of their lifetime of labor with us, our goal is to ensure that their bequests are used to generate revenue to support youth in our community in perpetuity. National Foster Care Month: Celebrate with us in May.

May is National Foster Care Month. The focus in 2024 is the partnership with families and youth to ultimately achieve permanency. Both child welfare professionals and caregivers play a significant role in building familial relationships and lifelong connections between youth and the people who are important to them.

CHOY helps families create a structured, therapeutic environment with intensive support from our team to help the children in our care return safely to their biological or find permanent families and homes as quickly as possible. We are always welcoming additional Resource Families to match with children in need of permanency.

390,000

There are over 390,000 children and youth in foster care.

20,000

Approximately 20,000 youth are emancipated from foster care without a permanent family. We provide round-the-year training for individuals and families who want to begin their foster care or adoption journey. By opening your heart and your home, you can make a profound difference in a child's life and contribute to the well-being of families in your community. Why foster care?

Safety and Stability

The primary purpose of foster care is to provide a safe and stable environment for a child who cannot be with their parents, for various reasons. Children who have been uprooted from their homes need a place where they can feel safe. Often, the place they previously called home was chaotic with no routines or a sense of normalcy. These children must learn what it's like to get up and go to school, eat regular meals, and have schedules. Knowing what is going to happen every day gives the child a sense of stability that is often lacking.

Education

Resources Families teach children what it means to be a kid. They learn math, science, reading, music, and how to enjoy being a kid. It often takes time and patience for children to relax enough to be themselves or even to figure out who they are. Resource Parents have the big task of helping children learn about themselves and the world around them in a positive way after experiencing abuse, neglect, trauma, loss, and disrupted relationships.

Stopping the Cycle

Often, foster care provides a safe transition period for the child while the biological family gets their issues resolved so they can be the parents they want to be. The Resource Parents not only support the child, but they support the parents, too. They help the parents fulfill their roles and feel less alone in their struggles. The biological parents can know their child is safe and being cared for while they focus on getting their lives on track. Foster care plays an important role in caring for kids in an already-burdened system. It is an essential component of bringing families together and helping kids to grow up and excel in life regardless of their past.

Returning in 2024 - Support groups!

Our Permanency Team is excited to bring back support groups for our resource families. Childcare is provided. Meetings occur the first Monday of each month, and topics will vary. Families are encouraged to bring snacks for themselves or to share.
